

THE MINUTES OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF  
GREENFIELD COMMUNITY UNIT SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 10  
February 5, 2018

The Board of Education of Greenfield Community Unit School District No. 10 met in special session in the Administrative Office on February 5, 2018.

1. President Rodney Knittel called the special meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. Upon roll call the following members were present: Josh Roberts, Chris Goode, Joe Kinser, Elliott Turpin, Brandi Rynders and Rodney Knittel. Chris Weller was absent. Also present were Superintendent Kevin Bowman, Gary White, Scott Stuart and Becky McClelland.
2. Roberts motioned and Goode seconded to approve the agenda as presented. Upon roll call Rynders, Goode, Kinser, Roberts, Turpin and Knittel voted "Aye". Motion carried.
3. President Knittel noted the board was meeting in special session to discuss the addition of a Junior High/High School Trap Shooting Club to the District. Superintendent Bowman announced that six high school students and seven junior high students are interested in the club. Gary White spoke to the board and noted he will serve as the coach of the club and Brandi Rynders will serve as the main contact. The initial sign-up fee is \$35 which will cover insurance and sign-up. Supplies will be paid for on a weekly basis. The coaches will pay for their certification and fingerprinting and will participate in the school's annual training. At this time, the plan is to practice at Starr in the rural Hettick area. They club can also practice in Bunker Hill or Jacksonville if space is not available in Hettick. The Greenfield-Northwestern sports coop agreement was mentioned. The trapshooting program can be shared at the next coop meeting in March, but will be too late for participation this year.
4. Opportunity for Citizens to Speak - Scott Stuart asked why the school needs to be involved in the club. White explained that the league requires a school name to participate. Stuart asked about insurance costs for the school and if rates would rise if this club was added. White responded that the club's insurance would cover any injuries and school would be secondary. Stuart wanted to know how it would be handled if a student did not have a gun and wanted to participate. White said that they have guns that can be loaned out. The club wants to apply for grants that would purchase a gun for a student if they did not have one. All the student would need to get started is completion of a hunter safety course and the \$35 fee. Stuart's other concern was how to keep the weapons away from the schools. White said that practices would be held on weekends and there would be no reason to have guns in vehicles during the school week. The program is a total of nine weeks. There are five weeks of competition and four weeks of practice. The league starts April 1<sup>st</sup>.
5. Roberts motioned and Goode seconded to approve the formation of a Junior High/High School Trapshooting Club with limitations as discussed. Upon roll call Rynders, Kinser, Roberts, Turpin, Goode and Knittel voted "Aye". Motion carried.
6. Other Business-A question was asked if this club had to be approved every year. Bowman noted he would have the coaches approved at every February board meeting and other issues could be discussed at that time.

7. Roberts motioned and Rynders seconded to adjourn the meeting at 6:30 p.m.
